

Leadership and Management (15 credits)

A Leadership and Management Concentration requires a minimum of 12 credits from Commerce and Business Administration with a minimum of 6 credits at the upper level (3000-4000). In order for students to fulfill their requirements for the BA in Applied Psychology or BA in Applied Psychology Honours, 15 credits must be completed. If all 15 credits are not from the faculty of Commerce and Business Administration we recommend SOSC 2140 (Behavior in Organizations) or SOSC 3140 (Organizational Theory) as the additional 3 credit course.
