General Information

Applications to the Honours program are only accepted from students currently enrolled in the BA Applied Psychology program. This program is designed for completion in the last year of a student's degree. Students should typically apply for the BA Applied Psychology program once they have completed about 60 credits, then apply for the Honours program going into their last year. Students must

due by April 30 before their Honours year. Use this checklist as a guide to help plan and track progress on your degree. Psychosocial Rehabilitation (15 credits) - Partially ONLINE

You must indicate your interest in this Concentration by filling out the Departmental form (online) by May 1 before the start of the Fall semester. (Fall start).

Abnormal Psychology (PSYC 2341)

Strongly Recommended:

Drugs and Behavior (PSYC 3341)

Required:

- 1. Mental Health Services and Systems: History and Trends (PSYC 5001) (Fall)
- 2. Psychosocial Rehabilitation Practitioner Competencies (PSYC 5003) (Fall)
- 3. Psychosocial Rehabilitation and Recovery (PSYC 5002) (Winter)
- 4. Psychosocial Rehabilitation: Best and Promising Practices (PSYC 5004) (Winter)
- 5. Seminar and Practicum in Psychosocial Rehabilitation (PSYC 5005) (Summer)

Forensic Psychology (15 credits- 12 credits from Crim with a min 6 UL credits)
It is recommended to take CRIM 1100, CRIM 1150 and CRIM 1160 in your first 2 years.
If not, two of them can be taken as part of your concentration and the other as a 1000-4000 Level Elective.

Required:

Psychology and Law (PSYC 3314)

Electives:

 Any four (4) UT courses from Criminology, with at least 6 credits at the 3000-4000 level.

Leadership and Management (15 credits)

A Leadership and Management Concentration requires a minimum of 12 credits from Commerce and Business Administration with a minimum of 6 credits at the upper-level (3000-4000). In order for students to fulfill their requirements for the BA in Applied Psychology or BA in Applied Psychology Honours, 15 credits must be completed. If all 15 credits are not from the faculty of Commerce and Business Administration, we recommend SOSC 2140 (Behavior in Organizations) or SOSC 3140 (Organizational Theory) as the additional 3 credit course.

Please see the Commerce & Business Faculty advisor or the BA Applied Psychology Coordinator for advice on particular groups of courses and how they can be tailored to your interests.

Disability and Applied Behavior Analysis (18 credits) - Partially ONLINE

You must indicate your interest in this Concentration by filling out the Departmental form (online) by May 1 before the start of the Fall semester. (Fall start).

- 2. Foundational Principles and Empirical Basis of Behaviour Analysis (DACS 4122) (Fall)
- 3. Disability in Context (DACS 4111) (Fall)

or

Autism Spectrum Disorder Across the Lifespan (DACS 3430) (Winter)

- 4. Applied Behaviour Analysis: Research And Applications (DACS 4123) (Winter)
- 5. Ethics in Applied Behaviour Analysis (DACS 4115) (Summer)
- 6. Advanced Topics in Applied Behaviour Analysis: Intervention (DACS 4116) (Summer)

NOTE: Scheduling of specific courses in particular semesters may vary.
