SUMMARY AND OVERALL CONCLUSIONS

For the new program, Douglas College has met the standard on curriculum; partially met the standard on students and has not met the standard on graduates. The action plan presented in table 13 identifies a clear and comprehensive plan to ensure that further development of the curriculum will result in graduates successfully achieving the competencies and Standards of Practice. For references see Appendix 60 and for the bibliography see Appendix 61.

Phasing out of Current Program

CRNBC reviewed Douglas College's discontinuing report in May 2013 and extended the program's recognition until Fall 2016. Two semesters will remain by Fall 2015: semester VII and semester VIII. Students in the current program have previously received written notification that the program is being phased out. Additional information about the phasing out process and transition planning includes:

- re-entry plan to add another nursing practice course and/or courses for those students who are unable to finish the program by April 2016 (e.g. for health reasons, extenuating circumstances) *at this time there are no re-entry students
- consistent faculty have been assigned to teach in the current program; ie: experienced faculty who have taught these courses/nursing practice have remained teaching the same courses until this program is completed
- faculty in both programs share resources and other than separate semester teams, all faculty are involved with decisions related to both programs

- responsibility and accountability for the current program is the same as for the new program: e.g., Director of Nursing, BSN coordinators, and committees provide support to students and faculty in the current program. As each semester is phased out a new semester begins therefore there is a not an increase in semesters or numbers of students
- evaluation processes continue such as course evaluations which have resulted in minor curriculum changes such as the revisions of learning activities and assignments
- summative evaluation processes such as graduate follow-up, workplace questionnaires will continue with the addition of an analysis of NCLEX results
- practice placements have been the same with the exception of Winter 2015 in
 Consolidated Practice Experience IV (CPE IV) where all students received Home Health placements whereas usually half the students receive Prevention (Public Health)
 experiences and half the students receive Home Health; this was due to a lack of acceptance from Prevention agencies and also the new semester IV community semester was offered at the same time

*Note: students in the current program have received a community semester previously to CPE IV

preceptorship requests for the last offering of practicum will occur Winter 2016 and occur at the same time as the first offering of practicum for the new program; usually Douglas College requests a maximum of 128 preceptors (practicum and CPE III) for the Winter semesters. The total number of preceptor requests for Winter 2016 will be less at 111 preceptors (56 students from new program + 55 students from the current program).

This will be a one-time only occurrence ¹⁴ and as in the past Douglas College will use Collaborative Learning/Teaching Units (CTUs).

- students in the current program are actively engaged with the development and informal evaluation of the new program, e.g. participate on curriculum and other committees; participate in the peer mentorship program; health sciences speaker series
- financial resources to support students to attend conferences always include students in the current program e.g. Canadian Nursing Students' Association conference; Education without Borders
- at the end of each academic year faculty celebrate the addition of a new semester and recognize the past work (say good-bye) of each semester that has been phased out
- there are initial plans to have a celebration at the end of the program for students, faculty, college employees, agency, program advisory committee members and others

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College of Registered Nurses of British Columbia (CRNBC) Education Program Review Committee (EPRC) Report of the Phase Two Review of the Newly Designed Baccalaureate Registered Nurse Program offered by Douglas College April 2015

Program Characteristics:

Douglas College has offered entry-level registered nurse education since 1975 with the nature of its programs evolving over time from a diploma to a baccalaureate credential. From 2006 onwards, Douglas College has independently offered a four year baccalaureate registered nurse program based on the Curriculum Guide (with usual formative modifications) developed by the former Collaborative Nursing Program in BC (CNPBC) which dissolved in 2004.

As a result of a comprehensive review to the program completed by the nursing faculty in 2010, Douglas College decided to make substantial curriculum changes and redesign the program. The newly designed program has a one-plus three academic year structure. The first year, called the Academic Foundations in Nursing, consists of non-nursing courses for prospective students to gain a strong sciences and liberal arts knowledge base before their admission to nurse courses. Students who successfully complete the Academic Foundations in Nursing are eligible to proceed through the admission process to enter the second year of the program and begin courses in the discipline of nursing. The nursing courses are offered over three academic years of two semesters each.

The new program admits 64 students twice a year (September and January), and is located at the David Lam Campus in the Health Sciences Building. The program is delivered on campus, normally on a full-time basis, with selected courses offered in a blended or hybrid format using communications technology. The nursing courses are offered in the fall and winter semesters with no classes during May to August. There are initial plans to offer international nursing electives during the summer semesters. The first students were admitted to the second year nursing courses in September 2013 and will graduate in April 2016.

Previous CRNBC Reviews of the Program:

Current Review (February 2015 - April 2015)

The College of Registered Nurses of British Columbia (CRNBC) reviewed the Baccalaureate Registered Nurse Program offered by Douglas College under the authority of the duties and objects of a college set out in the Health Professions Act (2010), Section 16 (2) (c)to establish the conditions or requirements for registration of a person as a member of the college. Section 19 (m) allows for the conditions or requirements for registration established by the college to include standards of academic or technical achievement, competencies or other qualifications, and requirements for providing evidence of good character. Section 19 (m.1) provides for the board of the college to specify academic or technical programs that are recognized by the college as meeting a standard established under 19 (m) (i). The recognition of registered nurse education programs in British Columbia is determined by program reviews conducted by the Education Program Review Committee (EPRC) established in Bylaw 1.21. The programs recognized by CRNBC are specified in Schedule C of the Bylaws.

The Bylaws of CRNBC approved by government establish the mandate and membership of the Education Program Review Committee (EPRC). For the purposes of this review the EPRC referred to Bylaw 1.21 (3) (b) which states: The education program review committee must: (b) review, to the extent the committee considers appropriate, new or changed nursing education programs and courses, in accordance with any applicable criteria established by the board, with a view to reporting to the board and making recommendations about whether the board should recognize those programs and courses, and any terms and conditions of recognition. The EPRC also referred to pertinent CRNBC Education Program and Course Review Policies.

Nursing Education Program Review Process

The EPRC conducted the review as set out in Education Program/Course Review Policy Section 8 and outlined below.

- On February 27, 2015 the EPRC conducted a preliminary review of the self-evaluation report submitted by Douglas College and instructed the site visit team retained by CRNBC. The site visitors, Kris Gustavson and Dr. June Anonson, attended by teleconference.
- The site visit was arranged and conducted on March 23rd and 24th, 2015 in accordance with Policy Section 9: The Site Visit Component of the Review Process. The site visit team submitted a written report to EPRC and a copy of this confidential report was sent to Douglas College at the same time it was sent to EPRC.
- The EPRC discussed the site visit report on April 24, 2015 with the site visitors. Kris
 Gustavson attended the meeting in person, and Dr. June Anonson attended by teleconference.
 After the site visitors left the meeting, the EPRC formulated the following tentative
 recommendation for discussion with representatives of the educational institution offering the
 program: Recognize the Baccalaureate Registered Nurse Program offered by Douglas
 College until June 30, 2021 without terms or conditions attached. A new program phase three
 review with site visit is to be completed before June 30, 2021.
- The EPRC then discussed its assessment and tentative recommendation with a representative from Douglas College who attended the EPRC meeting in person: Linda Pickthall, Director of Nursing.
- After the representative from the educational institution left the EPRC meeting, the EPRC considered the information obtained in discussion with her and decided upon its final report and recommendation to the CRNBC Board. There was no change in the tentative recommendation shared with the representative.

Final Deliberations:

The CRNBC Education Program and Course Review Policies guided the program review and recommendation. The Committee evaluated all the nursing education standards and indicators as met to the extent required for a new program phase two review. The presentation style of the self-evaluation report submitted by Douglas College set out the evidence clearly and comprehensively. Hence, the EPRC easily found sound evidence for the foregoing assessment in the self-evaluation report together with the site visit report.

Policy Section 7.6 (d) limits the length of recognition as an outcome of a phased-in review of the newly designed program to less than seven years. The EPRC noted also that Policy section 7 about New or Substantially Changed Nursing Education Programs sets out the CRNBC expectation that educational institutions submit a letter of intent if substantial changes are made to nursing education programs during the recognition period. The EPRC decided unanimously on the recommendation below to the CRNBC Board.

Recommendation:

Recognize the Baccalaureate Registered Nurse Program offered by Douglas College until June 30, 2021 without terms or conditions attached. A phase three review with site visit is to be completed before June 30, 2021.
