General Information

Applications to the <u>Honours program</u> are only accepted from students currently enrolled in the <u>BA</u> <u>Applied Psychology program</u>. This program is designed for completion in the last year of a student's degree. Students should typically apply for the BA Applied Psychology program once they have completed about 60 credits, then apply for the Honours program going into their last year. Students must submit two applications for the Honours program (<u>College admissions</u> and <u>PSYC Department</u>*). Both are due by April 30 before their Honours year.
