# IS DOUGLAS RIGHT EOR MEZ



Choosing a school can be tough: You want to find the right fit for you and your needs. Here are five questions to ask yourself and five answers about Douglas that will help you figure out if we're the right school for you.

#### WHAT DO I WANT TO DO?

If you know the answer to this question, we've got bachelor's degrees, career programs and university-transfer options to help you get started. And if you don't know, Douglas is a great place to find out. Here, you can earn credits that can be put toward a credential, with the assurance that your time and money are being put to good use.

#### WHAT ATMOSPHERE DO I PREFER FOR LEARNING?

Douglas gives you the opportunity to interact with your classmates and ask your professors questions about what you're learning. It's harder to get that in first- or second-year classes at a big university, where there are sometimes up to 500 students per class.

#### DO I LIKE BEING PART OF A COMMUNITY?

Maybe you're a joiner – or maybe you aren't. Either way, if you like getting to know people and have them call you by name, you'll love the smaller community at Douglas.

#### **HOW ARE MY GRADES?**

Universities often require high grades to get in, while colleges are more flexible. If university is your ultimate goal, you can still start at Douglas and then transfer your credits, if chosen carefully, to a university.

#### HOW MUCH MONEY DO I HAVE FOR SCHOOL?

Unless money is no object, then you – or your parents or supporters – probably want an education that won't leave you with massive debt. Douglas offers some of the lowest tuition fees in the province. If you're planning on getting a bachelor's degree from a university, you can save over \$4,500 by doing your first two years at Douglas and then transferring. Double those savings if you stay at Douglas to complete your degree.

"Having one-on-one time with instructors gives me the opportunity to build relationships with them." osh had no idea what career he wanted or which post-secondary to attend. But something he heard at a Douglas College info session helped him make up his mind.

"Rather than telling me why I should choose Douglas, they asked if Douglas was right for me. That in itself showed me that Douglas cares about its students. For me to succeed, I knew I needed to be in an environment that supported students' wellbeing and personal growth."

But he still didn't know what he wanted to do. He enrolled in General Studies so he could explore different subjects while earning credits he could put toward a program later on.

"I took some fantastic courses in business and French, but they weren't my calling. It was the sociology and psychology courses that truly sparked joy, and I discovered a passion for supporting and empowering other people." Josh decided to become a social worker, but the only programs offered were at universities. Josh wanted to stay at Douglas, where he was thriving in the close-knit community.

When Douglas launched its Bachelor of Social Work, Josh applied and transferred his credits into the program – and hasn't looked back. Once he graduates, he wants to work in community development and eventually get his Master of Social Work.



s a member of Kitimat's Haisla
Nation, Adelia is all too aware of the
gaps in health-care services in northern Indigenous communities. As a registered
nurse, she wants to do something about it.

"I really want to make an impact in nursing, for my own people at the very least. Indigenous health is an issue that gives me energy," says Adelia, a graduate of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program.

But she's not stopping at health care.
Adelia wants to join forces with Indigenous women in other fields, including social services, who are also looking to make a difference.

"Ideally, we will work together to close the gaps in services that are present right now for our people."

It's an ambitious project, but Adelia is up for the challenge. She has always fought to achieve her goals – and knows first-hand the power of persistence.

"Getting into the Nursing program was a challenge. There are tons of applicants, and I was denied three times in a row before finally getting in. Pushing myself to do better and not give up got me to where I am today."

## **UNIVERSITY HERE**

Did you know you can start your bachelor's degree at one school and then transfer your credits to another school to complete it? That's university transfer.

If you start at Douglas, you'll graduate with the same credential as students who started at university, but with a few advantages:

- · Get to know your classmates and receive one-on-one support from your professors. Douglas classes typically have 35 students, whereas first-year courses at big universities can have up to 500 students in a class.
- Get more hands-on learning through work placements, overseas field schools, labs, field trips and on the stage (for performing arts students).
- Save over \$4,500 by taking the first two years of your degree at Douglas.

lejandra's childhood was a tribute to sustainability: Her parents designed their home to be energy efficient through maximizing natural light and eliminating the need for heating and cooling systems. They even grew their own crops and raised their own animals for food. Inspired by her parents, Alejandra plans to become an architect so she can make her own contributions to sustainable housing.

"I explored environmental engineering first but wasn't a fan of the heavy math focus. I switched to environmental design because the creative aspects of architecture would allow me to express myself while helping the environment," she says.

Alejandra is starting with the Associate of Arts in Environmental Studies at Douglas to gain an understanding of the environment that she can apply to her future design work.

"The program is so versatile," she says. "Since environmentalism can be applied in almost every field, I've been able to take a variety of courses, from biology to anthropology. It's fun to learn about the environment from different perspectives."

Once she graduates, Alejandra will have 60 credits she can transfer to university to complete her bachelor's. From there, she'll complete a masters program in architecture to become a licensed architect so she can start her career designing sustainable housing.
