N:	Course Content: Student manuscripts will form the bulk of the course content. Published texts, such as <i>The Last Crossing</i> by Guy Vanderhaeghe, and <i>Reindeer Moon</i> by Elizabeth Marshall Thomas, will also be used.

Q:	Means of Assessment A minimum of five written assignments, including one character sketch, one scene, one short story, and one opening chapter of a novel, all of which will include two pages of historical source material as evidence of research conducted. In addition, students will be required to submit a written report on a published piece of historical fiction. Up to 80% of the final mark will be based on written assignments, the remainder on in-class exercises and class participation. Students are required to attend 80% of the workshops. A student missing more than 20% of the workshops without instructor permission receives a 0 in class participation.
