	 The successful student should be able to 1. recognize the significance of the literary and non-literary or cultural context of a work being studied, such as biographical, historical, mythological, and philosophical contexts; 2. read critically secondary sources, such as criticism and other texts by the same author, as an aid to comprehending the primary text being studied; 3. read critically and independently works or aspects of works not discussed in class; 4. discern both continuity and change within the body of poetry written in English; and 5. formulate a thesis on a given subject in one or more specific works and develop this, using suitable textual evidence.

	Selected literary texts (see sample list). Selected secondary source materials: - autobiographical material - biography - literary criticism and theory - cultural and intellectual history - other arts (music, fine arts, film, etc.)
