## O. COURSE OBJECTIVES

## Reading

- 1) The student will learn to recognize the significance of the literary and non-literary or cultural context of a work being studied, such as historical, philosophical, mythological, and biographical contexts:
- 2) the student will learn to read, critically, secondary sources, such as criticism and other texts by the same author, as an aid to comprehending the primary text being studied;
- 3) the student will learn to read, critically, works or aspects of works not discussed in class; and
- 4) the student will learn to understand the works studied in the context of theories and traditions of comedy, such as the comic hero, the absurdist vision, and psychological theories of comedy.

#### Writing

Given a general subject, such as imagery, the student will learn to formulate a thesis on this subject in one or more specific works and develop this, using suitable text evidence.

# P. COURSE CONTENT

- autobiographical material
- biography
- literary criticism and theory
- cultural and intellectual history

# Q. METHOD OF INSTRUCTION
