0. **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

Reading

- 1) The student will learn to recognize the significance of the literary and non-literary or cultural context of a work being studied. such as historical, philosophical, mythological, and biographical contexts:
- 2) the student will learn to read, critically, secondary sources, such as criticism and other texts by the same author, as an aid to comprehending the primary text being studied;
- 3) the student will learn to read, critically, works or aspects of works not discussed in class: and

Writing
