#### O. Course Objectives:

The student will develop skills in aural recognition and sightsinging of tonal melodies, harmonies, and rhythms.

#### P. Course Content:

- 1. Aural Recognition
- a. Intervals within an octave, ascending and descending.
- b. Triads in root position, first and second inversions.
- c. Diatonic melodies in major and minor modes. Such melodies contain simple rhythms; scale-wise motion; tonic, dominant, and subdominant triads; and intervals of the 8ve, 5th, 4th, 3rd, 6th, and 2nd.
- d. Bass factor, quality, and position of chords in progressions containing the following: I, I6, I6/4, IV, ii6, V and V7.
- e. The rhythmic component of groups of tones in both simple and compound metres.
- 2. Sightsinging
- a. Intervals, triads, and diatonic melodies with simple rhythms.
- b. Various rhythmic exercises.

#### Q. Method of Instruction:

Students will receive two hours of class instruction per week: one hour of harmonic dictation; one hour of sightsinging and melodic/rhythmic dictation.
