O. Course Objectives:

The student will develop skills in aural recognition and sightsinging of tonal melodies, harmonies, and rhythms.

P. Course Content:

- 1. Aural Recognition
- a. Melodies which contain longer phrases, some chromatic tones, and modulation to closely-related keys.
- b. Simple two-part melodic textures.
- c. Soprano and bass factors, quality, and position of chords in progressions which include: root-position and inverted seventh chords, borrowed chords, applied (secondary) dominant chords, the Neapolitan Sixth chord, and non-modulating sequences.
- d. Longer and more complex rhythmic exercises.
- 2. Sightsinging
- a. Melodies which include large intervals, harmonic and non-harmonic chromatic tones, and modulation to closely-related keys.
- b. Longer and more complex rhythmic exercises.

Q. Method of Evaluation:

Students will receive two hours of class instruction per week: one hour of harmonic dictation; one hour of sightsinging and melodic/rhythmic dictation.
