O. Course Objectives:

The student will develop skills in aural recognition and sightsinging of melodies, harmonies, and rhythms.

P. Course Content:

- 1. Aural Recognition
- a. Melodies which contain longer phrases, more chromatic tones, and modulation to distant keys.
- b. Melodies in two- and three-part textures.
- c. Soprano and bass factors, quality, and position of chords in progressions which include the following: augmented sixth chords, diminished seventh chords, extended dominant chords, and modulation to distant keys.
- d. Complex rhythmic patterns, including changing metres.
- 2. Sightsinging
- a. Melodies which contain more complex rhythms, chromatic alterations, and modulations to distant keys.
- b. Non-tonal melodies.
- c. Complex rhythmic exercises.

Q. Method of Instruction:

Students will receive two hours of class instruction per week; one hour of harmonic dictation; one hour of sightsinging and melodic/rhythmic dictation.
