N:	Course Content: In this course, within the context of the Douglas College Psychiatric Nursing Department's caring philosophy and conceptual framework, students will focus on developing the psychiatric nursing role and promoting health in clients through an understanding of group process and the acquisition of group skills. Specific concepts that will be addressed are:				
	 History and evolution of group treatment processes and theoretical perspectives. Group structure and process. Development of group skills. Phases of group development including group membership roles and leadership styles. Examination of personal attitudes, values, and beliefs.
